## TSU agrees to dialogue and forum

The Tarlac State University administration accommodated the queries of the *not qualified* TSU-CAT examinees last May 24 at the TSU Main AVR and May 27 at the conference hall of the *Sangguniang Panlalawigan* (Provincial Board).

Queries and concerns raised on both avenues are centered on the transparency of admission test results and the appeal for reconsideration of those who were not qualified.

The administration led by Vice President for Administration and Finance Dr. Glenard Madriaga provided the

answers to the queries of the examinees and some parents.

The dialogue became an instant lecture on the provisions of Republic Act No. 1093 (Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act), various budgets allotted to TSU, and the standardized admission test.

“We are operating under the law. May batas po tayong sinusunod (We have a law to follow),” Madriaga said in reference to the university’s implementation of R.A. No. 10931.

“Nakasulat po kasi sa ating implementing rules and regulations, rule

no. 6 tungkol po doon sa quality standards na mayroon po tayong enrollment capacity...the CHED shall ensure that the number of students that the SUC, katulad po ng Tarlac State University, iyong tatanggapin po niya does not exceed the optimal number of students that can be enrolled in each program offered by TSU and does not exceed the number of students that the existing resources and capacity of SUC, like TSU, can carry based on pre-determined parameters to be determined by CHED,” CASS Dean Dr. Agnes Macaraeg added.

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# TSU partners with DAR, DSWD, PAO



A consultation meeting was held with the stakeholders under the Department of Agrarian Reform-Department of Social Welfare and Development (DAR-DSWD) in connection with the Convergence on Livelihood Assistance for Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBOs) Project (CLAAP) on May 27, 2019 at Max's Restaurant, SM City, Tarlac.

# TSU agrees to dialogue and forum

(It is written in the implementing rules and regulations, rule no. 6, regarding the quality standards that we have an enrollment capacity...the CHED shall ensure that the number of students that the SUC, just like Tarlac State University, those the university accepts does not exceed the optimal number of students that can be enrolled in each program offered by TSU and does not exceed the number of students that the existing resources and capacity of SUC, like TSU, can carry based on pre-determined parameters to be determined by CHED.)

Madriaga differentiated budgets received by TSU from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) coursed through the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and from the Congress.

“Pag sinabing income ito iyong ibibigay ng DBM through CHED sa amin based doon sa enrollment. For your information po, maraming report na gagawin ang TSU pagkatapos ng enrollment. Isa-submit niyan iyong data bago i-release iyong pondo na counterpart ng gobyerno.” Madriaga explained.

(When we say income, it is what the DBM, through CHED, will give us based on the enrollment turnout. For your information, there are a lot of reports to be made by TSU after the enrollment. The data is then submitted before the funds are released which is the counterpart of the government.)

“Kasi dalawa po iyong budget eh, iyong pondo na pumapasok sa takbo ng mga SUCs. Isa iyong nanggagaling sa kongreso. Pangalawa iyong special budget na sinasabi. Iyong special budget, ito iyong dating binabayad ng estudyante, ibinibigay na ngayon ng government. Yung GAA naman ito iyong dumadaan pa sa kongreso. Iyong nanggagaling sa DBM through CHED, kung paano mo gagastusin iyon, Board ang mayroong say na doon,” Madriaga furthered.

(Because there are two budgets, the

funds that enters for the operation of SUCs. One is given through congress. The second is what we call the special budget. The special budget, it is what the students are previously paying which is now being given by the government. While the GAA, this is the one that goes under the congress. The one that comes from DBM through CHED, how it should be spent, only the Board has a say about it.)

After the group of examinees heard the explanations, they raised their concerns on the admission test. Irregularities on the admission test results and the content of the test proper were highlighted in their queries.

Clifford Agcaoili, representative of the examinees, claims that the TSU-CAT examinees in the previous years took the exam for a longer period compared to their batch who were given 45 minutes.

“About naman po doon sa results ng entrance exam namin. Nagtataka po talaga kami bakit not qualified iyong lumabas and last year daw, noong mga nakaraang taon po is sobrang tagal daw po ng entrance exam...So kami po, bakit hindi niyo kami binigyan ng sapat na oras para makapag-exam and para maging maayos and maganda iyong magiging kalabasan ng entrance exam namin?” said Agcaoili.

(Regarding the results of our entrance exam. We are just wondering why we were not qualified, and last year, during the previous years, the entrance exam took a lot of time...So why have not you given us enough time to take the exam so that we may have a better entrance exam outcome.)

In response to Agcaoili’s query, Mr. Andie Quiballo, Head of Testing Unit, explained, “Ngayon pinalitan iyong test na iyon para ma-accommodate iyong mga graduate na ngayon ng senior high school. Kasi iyong unang test na iyon is ipapakita niya sa’yo kung saan ka naka-align na courses or programs. Now for this batch at iyong mga naunang batch sa inyo na product ng K-12, hindi na kailangan iyon

kasi alam niyo na kung saan ang track ninyo.”

(Now, the exam was replaced to accommodate those who have graduated from Senior High School because the previous test shows which courses or programs you are aligned with. Now for this batch and the batch before you which are products of K-12, you no longer need it because you already know which track you are on.)

The group wanted to assert their right to information and obtain copies of their test. However, Dr. Grace Hasegawa, Director of Institutional Planning and Development Office, emphasized the ethical standards among psychologists and psychometricians. In addition, she gave a word that the unit will review the test manual if raw scores could be disclosed.

As a resolution, the TSU administration representatives said that they will raise the reconsideration to the TSU Board of Regents. Examinees who received 10th to 14th percentile ranks will be reviewed based on their socio-economic profile, as indicated in their application forms, admission test score, and their senior high school general average.

## Concerns elevated to the provincial level

The Provincial Board or the *Sangguniang Panlalawigan* invited the university for a forum to address queries and clarifications on the TSU admission test.

The university was represented by key officials, namely Dr. Agnes M. Macaraeg, CASS Dean; Dr. Erwin P. Lacanlale, CoEd Dean; Dr. Grace Anne C. Hasegawa, IPDO Director; Mr. Andie Rafael E. Quiballo, Testing Unit Head; and Ms. Jazzel Llanelli E. Manalo, OPAI OIC-Director.

The forum was moderated by Vice Governor Atty. Carlito David and Committee Chair on Education Board

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# TSU Students Showcase Various Researches at SALIKSIKLABAN 2019



To recognize and highlight exceptional student researches, Tarlac State University - Technology Development, Transfer and Commercialization Office (TSU TDTCO), in collaboration with the University Research Office (URO), Gender and Development Office (GAD) and the Supreme Student Council (SSC), held the second university-wide undergraduate research competition called SALIKSIKLABAN 2019 on May 16-17, 2019 at the Academic Building, TSU Lucinda Extension Campus.

The opening ceremony was graced by the Vice President for Research and Extension Dr. Armee N. Rosel, TDTCO Director Engr. Emir SF Sicangco, and GAD Director Dr. Rita Pulmano.

SALIKSIKLABAN 2019 was divided into two categories namely: Arts, Business, Law Education and Social Sciences (ABLESS) and Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM).

Among the 18 entries under ABLESS, students from the College of Public Administration and Governance namely Juniper Dizon, Judy Ann Santos, and Aira Jane Zarsadias ranked 1st with their research entitled “Implementation of the National Organic Agricultural Program in Capas, Tarlac: An Evaluation.” The group

garnered 90.33% score and received 15,000 pesos cash prize.

Solo researcher, Jerich Ralph Lobo, from the College of Public Administration and Governance, placed second with a grade of 85.33% with his research entitled “Plight of Disadvantaged Elderly in the city of Tarlac: A Case Study.” Lobo received 10,000 pesos cash prize.

The third placer came from the collaboration of the six students of the College of Education, namely Bernadette Evis, Azalea Anne Galla, Kristan Quilantic, Lalaine Santos, Geraldine Sibayan, and Ruth Visa. Their work entitled “Challenges encountered by Aetas in English Language Learning” garnered 82.6%, they received 7,000 pesos cash prize.

The same group who placed first in the ABLESS category also won the Best Poster award, from which they received 2,000 pesos cash prize.

However, researches under STEM category with potential for patent protection, transfer or commercialization may qualify for funding assistance based on the recommendation of the panel of experts and TSU officials.

The first placer under STEM category came from the College of Engineering

and Technology, from the research work entitled “Development and Fabrication of a Digital Apparatus for Sieve Analysis and Soil Classifications” by Kaiser Aguilar, Arnel Jude Calma, Pauline Manzano, Kristel Ann Miranda and Gemmark Sicat. Their work garnered 87.6% and received 20,000 pesos cash prize.

The second placer is also from CET, namely Daniela Marry Antalan, Everline Arriola, Shaira Jean-Mel Guevarra, Collen Mallari, and Pierre Vincent Rubi, with their research “Utilization of Expanded Polystyrene in Developing Interlocking Lightweight Hollow blocks.” Their work was graded with 86.33%. They received 15,000 pesos cash prize.

The research “Development, Fabrication and Performance Evaluation of 3D Printer Filament Maker Machine” by Aryn Joyce Joves, Shaye Caroline Manlupig, Angelica Pangilinan, and Vivian Tiglao, placed third with a grade of 85.3%. The group received 10,000 pesos cash prize.

Meanwhile, the Best in Poster under STEM category came from the College of Computer Studies, entitled “Eaterest: A Progressive Web Application-Based Platform Applied to Food Hub” by

Tarlac State University's Integrated Management System Office (IMS) conducted a seminar and refresher course about documented information on Friday, May 10 at the Engineering AVR.

Dr. Julieta M. Lagasca, Director of the Integrated Management System Office, welcomed the participants and stated that the two-day seminar intends to raise awareness of TSU employees about ISO 9001:2015 or the Quality Management System that is being implemented by the university.

OIC Vice President for Planning and

Quality Assurance Prof. Redemptor G. Toledano expressed his gratitude to the participants and introduced the newly designated vice-presidential office and its units to function under OVPPQA, including the IMS Office.

He assured the employees to give their best to achieve the university's vision to become a premier university in the Asia-Pacific region. "We do public service; we have to satisfy our clients," Toledano added.

Engr. Maricar N. Banting discussed the details on the methods and procedures

of registering and controlling documents. She also talked about the proper controlling of records through identification, storage protection, setting of retention period, review and disposal related to the Integrated Management System of TSU.

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Member Harnes Sembrano. In attendance to the forum are the board members from the three congressional districts of Tarlac.

Affected examinees and parents were also present in the said forum.

According to Sembrano, this forum was called for due to the privilege speech delivered by Board Member Henry De Leon during their last session which is centered on the concerns and queries of students and parents regarding the TSU-CAT.

The honorable members of the board raised questions which are similar to those addressed during the dialogue held on May 24.

The Provincial Governor, Hon. Susan Yap, joined halfway through the forum. She emphasized the budgetary concerns in the Congress.

"The budget is not enough. They [Congress] allocated 40 billion and how

much is only given to SUCs? 14 billion ba, if I am correct," said Yap.

Gov. Yap expressed her understanding of the predicament of TSU regarding admission of freshmen. With this, she suggested resolutions to the Provincial Board to help the university and the Tarlac constituents.

"We cannot immediately, and I'm with TSU here, accept all students because there's no space, there's no faculty enough to address it right away this coming school year, this coming semester," Yap explained.

"Since free tuition fee na tayo sa Sanggunian, sa Kapitolyo, nagbibigay ng scholarship. Parang pino-propose ko i-scrap na po namin 'yung scholarship assistance and probably divert the funds to provide infrastructure sa TSU," Yap added.

(Since [we have the] free tuition fee

and we here at the Board, at the Capitol, provide scholarships, I am proposing that we scrap the scholarship assistance and probably divert the funds to provide infrastructure for TSU.)

Yap also appealed to the TSU representatives to soften the university's stand on examination policy and lobby the reconsideration of examinees to the Board of Regents. She suggested to revive the former extension campuses of the university in Victoria, Pura, and La Paz.

The public forum concluded with additional resolutions from the Provincial Board to be presented to the TSU Board of Regents and the Congress. The resolutions cover the reconsideration of the senior high school honor graduates, applicants who come from poor families, and Sangguniang Kabataan officials and the increase of budget for the education sector. # Opt for improving standards

*Education is a right, but its exercise demands corresponding responsibilities.*

Given that rights are not absolute, any school or university requires its prospective students to undergo admission examinations and to set a cut-off score to ensure the standards of the institution.

This month, a group of TSU college admission test takers who received a not qualified remark sought for a dialogue with the TSU administration for reconsideration highlighting the constitutionally protected right to education guided by the statute on free higher education or Republic Act No. 10931 (Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act). This alliance of students was organized to make a series of protests in front of the university's gates regarding their alleged non-acceptance.

Tarlac State University (TSU) envisions to be a premier University in the Asia-Pacific region. Its mission is to provide equitable access to quality education for people empowerment, professional development, and global competitiveness. TSU has to step up to ensure that its vision and mission will be

attained. There is no other time but now to gradually provide better service to its stakeholders.

The university has always been bound by existing legislations. With the full implementation of R.A. No. 10931, it is now an opportunity for the students to finish their chosen degrees free from any form of charge – an avenue for improving standards. But there are reasons to be considered.

With existing legislations and quality education in the formula, one must follow objective standards as measurement. With this, TSU uses a standardized admission test from Pearson Education to assess the academic capability of the students who have graduated from Senior High School.

In accordance with Rule II Section 4 of the Implementing Rules and Regulations of R.A. No. 10931, the provision states: "Students will be eligible to receive these benefits, provided they qualify under the admission and retention requirements of the SUCs (state universities and colleges) and LUCs (local universities and colleges)."

The implementation of the law has a certain condition. The right to a free quality tertiary education demands a corresponding responsibility from its

beneficiaries.

Also, the university cannot forsake its existing rules and regulations regarding the admission of students. But due to the dialogues made among the TSU administration, concerned students and their parents, and the local government, the university, through its Board of Regents, made a compromise and considered re-evaluating the examinees who fell short from the cut-off score.

Given that the university has limited resources, and an allocated budget by the government, still the university could not accommodate all the students. The university is also taking into consideration the conduciveness of the university as an educational institution being able to provide quality in service, education, and facilities for all its stakeholders.

It is not the university's purpose to deprive students of their rights. Inasmuch as TSU would like to accommodate everyone, the institution is bound by existing resources, policies, and legislations. If the university will go absolute, quality education is at stake. Nevertheless, TSU chooses to remain equitable – to give fair and reasonable treatment to those who were qualified and duly reconsidered.

# TSU organizes its first Career Week



The Career, Education, and Job Placement Service (CEJPS) Unit launched its first Career Week on May 20-24, 2019 which is composed of six major events for the graduating students and midyear interns.

The event themed "Workforce-Ready TSUians" aims to bring out opportunities for the graduating students and interns.

Students were given bookmarks consisting of the six major events for the Career Week wherein facilitators will put appropriate stamps for every event attended. This is also included as one of the requirements of the graduating students stated in Office Memorandum Order no. 44 dated May 15, 2019.

Listed on the bookmarks are: Professional Examination Hacks, Adulting 101, Company Campus Roadshow, Professional Headshot, Mock-Job Interview, and Career Fair 2019.

These activities include a booth for government services, seminars on labor education, pre-employment, and work ethics and values, graduate school know-how, and professional headshots for



resumes to be uploaded in portals taken by the Communicators' Guild Officers. A mock job interview was also facilitated by Psychology students wherein graduating students were required to wear corporate attire in preparation for their job interviews.

For courses with board examinations and students who are interested to take the Civil Service Examination, a 'Professional Examination Hacks' seminar was organized as part of their preparation wherein the colleges were given respective schedules.

"The Career Week is actually an integration of all career related activities that is especially made for TSU students. Essentially, the main goal of this very first Career Week of the university is to prepare the students in the world of work. This activity provides avenue for the students to be exposed in different

career development paths and also generate jobs and internship opportunities for our graduating students," said Ms. Laarni Capinding, Unit Head of CEJPS.

"[In the] outside world, the work is competitive. Mas maganda na talagang prepared sila hindi lang sa trabaho na pupuntahan nila, pati na rin sa interview, sa process kung paano sila manamit. Naniniwala kasi ako sa first impression (It's much better if the graduates are prepared for the work that they are applying for, including preparedness in job interview and professional attire. Personally, I believe in first impressions)," said Mr. Jim Reyes, Recruitment Staff of Acabar, when asked about the benefits of the having a career week for graduating students.

The last day of the Career Week was allotted for the 2019 TSU Career Fair with Services Caravan wherein the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with TSU Partners was held followed by employment interviews from the various companies which are open for job vacancies.
